Hero of Three Wars Retires From MVM.

Massachusetts Women Honored by National President, W. R. C.

By the retirement of Capt James P. Claro of Co M, 5th infantry, the militia will lose one of its oldest and most efficient officers, and one who has served his country for over 40 years. The captain, who retires with the rank of major, is the hero of three wars, the civil, the Spanish American and Philippines, and in each of which he performed conspicuous service. He was born in Chelsea 53 years ago and when the civil war broke out young Claie was but 15 years old. The news of the firing on Sumter awakened all the military spirit within him and he was determined to become a soldier. His desires were not sanctioned by his parents, but that had no effect upon the boy. He had decided to throw himself into the breach in behalf of his country, and so far as he was concerned, that settled the question. question.

At the close of the wai Capt Clare went to West Acton and later to Leominster. About 30 years ago he went to Hudson and has resided there ever since, excepting when the country was having a vigorous dispute, which led to warfare, then Capt Clare would be engaged as a soldier seeking to protect his country's flag.

April 30, 1897 he received his commission as captain of Co M, 5th regt, MVM, and was with the regiment during its services in the Spanish-American war, and in the course of that service was acting major for five months.

When it became evident that there was to be fighting in the Philippines capt Clare was as determined to participate in it as he was insistent that his services should be accepted in 1861. He carefully made his plans, but did not take his fellow-townsmen into his confidence, and they were greatly surprised in July, 1859, when they learned that he had decided to retire from an active and lucrative business life and accept a commission as first lleutenant in the 26th regt, USV, under Col Rice, who was Capt Clare's commander when the latter was mustered out after his term of service in the war of the rebellion.

Upon his return home he was given a grand reception, in which the whole town participated. The affair was one of the most significant events in the town's history and Hudson's hero of three wars was given a royal welcome.
