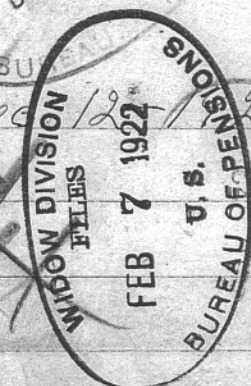
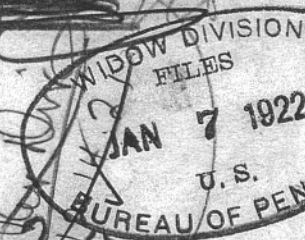

Six years my husband was an invalid from paralysis. The last 4 years he was entirely helpless and I cared for him night and day until the last six months

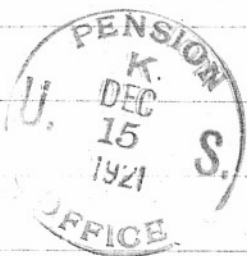

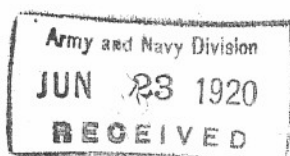

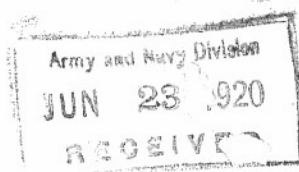

1st Maine Cavalry Ins. Ctf. 150148, I have to say that Mr. Elliott has had at least two attacks of Apoplexy, one in the fall of 1915, the other in the summer of 1917 resulting in hemiplegia of the left side. There is also a deterioration of all his faculties both bodily and mental. He is unable to walk, although he sometimes attempts it. when he is sure to fall. His speech is so indistinct that it is impossible to understand him. A part of the time, the evacuations, both from the bowels and from the bladder are involuntary. His wife, who takes care of him cannot leave him at all. In doing her housework she has to go when he is at least every five minutes. He is entirely dependent upon her aid for everything

Sir:

It appears from the records of this Bureau that you were pensioned in December 1880, at the rate of \$4 per month from February 3, 1864, and \$8 per month from April 8, 1880, for chronic diarrhoea, based on your service in the above cited organization. On December 18, 1907, your claim was allowed under the act of February 6, 1907, at the rate of \$12 per month from April 24, 1907. On August 18, 1913, your claim was allowed under the act of May 11, 1912, as amended by the act of March 4, 1913, at the rates of \$16.50 per month from May 20, 1912, \$21.50 per month from April 3, 1915, and \$27 per month from April 3, 1920, the rates provided for a service of one and one-half years during the Civil War where the age attained is 66, 70 and 75 years, respectively. Your rate was subsequently increased to \$38 per month from June 10, 1918, under the provisions of the act of Congress of that date.

It now appears by a recent report from the War Department that subsequent to your discharge from the above cited organization you enlisted August 22, 1864, in Co. M, 3rd Mass. H. A., and were discharged therefrom June 17, 1865.

Section 4724, Revised Statutes of the United States, provides that no person in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps, shall draw both a pension as an invalid and the pay of his rank or station in the service, hence the payment to you of pension during the period covered by your second term of military service was contrary to law, and was obtained through concealment on your part of the fact of your re-enlistment, you having stated, under oath, that you were not in the military or naval service subsequent to February 2, 1864, the first reference to service in the 3rd

Mass. H. A., being contained in a letter filed in this Bureau August 24, 1918, by Mr. John D. Anderson, wherein he requests on your behalf reissue of your certificate to give you the benefit of such service.

Your certificate will reissue under the act of May 11, 1912, as amended by the acts of March 4, 1913 and June 10, 1918, on the basis of a service of two and one-half years during the Civil War, at the rates of \$18 per month from May 20, 1912, \$24 per month from April 3, 1915, and \$40 per month from June 10, 1918; a deduction will be made of subsequent payments and a sum sufficient to reimburse the Government for the amount erroneously paid you, viz, \$4 per month from August 22, 1864, to June 17, 1865, inclusive, will be deducted from your current pension.

Under the provisions of the act of Congress of December 21, 1893, you will be allowed a period of thirty days from receipt hereof in which to make such answer as you deem proper to show cause why the action above indicated should not be taken.

The evidence, which must be duly sworn to before some officer authorized to administer oaths, should be firmly attached to the inclosed evidence slip. It may be forwarded in the accompanying envelope which does not require a stamp.

Sir;

In the

Case of Daniel H. Elliot, Applicant for increase of pension, (Co I First Maine Cavalry, Pension Certificate no. 180148) I have to say that Mr. Elliot was originally pensioned for chronic diarrhoea.

He tells me that this disease continued to trouble him for many years. As late as 1892 he had frequent attacks of diarrhoea that were difficult to control.

Now his condition is as follows: In Jan. 1915 he had an attack of cerebral hemorrhage resulting in Hemiplegia affecting the left side.

He improved somewhat after this, so that he recovered, in part, the use of the arm and the leg. In June 1917 he had a second attack of the same nature, more severe than the first, resulting in complete disability.

He is able to walk a short distance, with

the aid of a cane after he is helped on to his feet. His left arm is helpless, his speech is difficult and indistinct and his mental processes are slow and labored. His wife assists him to dress and cuts up his food for him because he cannot use his arm.

He is entirely incapacitated from performing manual labor and requires the aid of an assistant

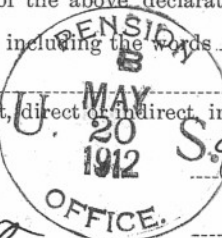

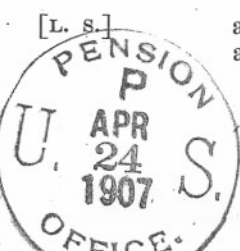

I, Daniel H. Elliott of Maynard in the county of Middlesex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, formerly a private in Captain Chadbourne's Co. 9th Me. Cav. Vol. on oath depose and say

That for five years previous to my enlistment in said Co. 9. I worked out on the farm for various farmers, haying, ploughing, driving team, getting of wood and general farm work except what I went to school about twelve weeks each winter for three winters and also except about eight months which I worked in a woolen factory, as piecer boy, at North Vassalboro. Maine.

During this five years I lived with my father at Vassalboro, Maine and was always in excellent health.

After my discharge in Feb. 1864 I returned to Vassalboro and made my home with my father, Francis

Elliott, for something over
 two years, going to Oxford Me.
 to work twice in that time
 and staying the first time
 about six weeks and the
 second time about two months.
 At these times I tried to work
 at spinning in a water
 mill, but was attacked
 both times with chronic
 diarrhea and obliged to give
 it up. In the fall of 1866
 I went to Oxford Maine again
 to work at the same business
 + worked a year and about
 seven months excepting about
 three months that I was
 sick. In the spring of 1868
 I moved to Norway Maine.
 Worked till Oct: 1869 at spinning.
 Then moved to Canada + remained
 till first of March 1870. Then
 went to Seniston Maine, +
 remained till about August-
 1871. Then moved to Gray
 Maine and remained till
 March 1873, when I moved

back to Sewiston and lived there till Jan. 1878 when I moved to Maynard, Mass where I have remained till the present-time. What-work I have done during this time was in some mill, & in connection with spinning or crossing.

About the first of August-1862 I went with my company on a reconnoitering expedition to Rappahannock Station, Va. While there a heavy rain storm came up, & during the afternoon I was wet through & remained so till the next-day. Then I rode back with the company to camp at Warrenton Va. The sun was very hot, & when near camp I felt a dizzy sensation in the head and asked permission to ride ahead into camp which was granted. On arriving at camp I thought it was not very

serious and cleaned off my horse. When the company arrived I undertook to take care of the Captain's horse.

While doing it, I fainted, & fell to the ground, was picked up and carried into my tent.

The next morning I was taken to Warrenton City and placed in a building used for a temporary hospital, and sent either that night or the next day to the Egerton General Hospital at Washington D.C.

In my opinion it was a case of partial stroke. Since this time I cannot be in the hot sun for half an hour or so without feeling dizzy and sick at my stomach, and for that reason have always worked under cover when I have worked at all, since leaving the army. I also find that there are certain kinds of work which I cannot do under cover. For instance, if I attempt to

saw wood the blood rushes to my head and I have to quit it, & rest several hours.

I stayed at the Egginton Hospital till late in the fall, probably October, when I had recovered sufficiently to desire to join my regiment. After an examination by the Surgeon and the Inspecting General Surgeon my request was granted.

I think it was in March 1863 - at least it was in the wet, muddy season - I was detailed as an orderly for the Army of the Potomac and assigned to duty at Gen. Robinson's Headquarters, Commander of the Second Division of the First Army Corps.

The night I was detailed, I was sent with a dispatch to Gen. Baxter Commander of the Second Brigade. It was quite dark and I was directed by the camp fires almost entirely. In going toward one of them, I rode into a ditch, was



thrown from my horse and injured in the abdomen, so that I was quite lame and sore there for a long time. Soon after I had a slight touch of the chronic diarrhoea. In the fall of 1863 I was sent back to my company. It was not long before the chronic diarrhoea became acute and severe. I received treatment from the Surgeon of the Regiment:-

In Nov. or Dec. 1863 Capt:-

Chadbourne said I must not remain longer in camp. He took me to the Surgeon's Headquarters, had me examined and I was sent to the General Hospital at Brandy Station Va. I remained here two months or so, run down very low, was told by the Surgeon that I stood but one chance in a hundred to live, and asked if I had any request to leave. The Chaplain came and prayed

with me. Then the nurse wrote to my father what my condition was. My father saw the Adjutant-General of Maine and he ordered that I be sent home on a furlough. But Gen. Meade had ordered that no furlough be granted except to those who were enlisted. So the Surgeon ordered me to be sent to Washington, saying that I could be sent home on furlough from there. When I got to Alexandria Va. the nurse who was detailed to accompany me said I could not go to Washington as orders were issued that no more sick be sent there. So I was taken to the Third Division General Hospital. I was here a short time, when my father came after me and I was discharged Feb. 2nd 1864, and taken home by my father.

When I got home I was placed under the care of Dr. Barrows of Vassalboro, Maine.

Was treated by him for several months. When I partially recovered. About a year and a half from the time of discharge, I was treated for the same disease, chronic diarrhoea, by Dr. Beckwith of Vassboro Maine. Both of these physicians are now dead.

I have always been obliged to work indoors, and frequently have to leave work entirely on account of the chronic diarrhoea. These attacks last from a few days to several weeks. When I worked at Oxford Maine, one attack lasted for six weeks. I consulted an apothecary and he gave me Dr. Seth Arnold's Balsam, & since that I have always kept this balsam in the house & used it when I feel the disease coming on & never had any doctor till after I came to Weymouth Mass. There is hardly a day passes that I am free from

Chronic pains. From the time of my discharge to the present I have been unable to do anything for about one fourth of the time and when I have worked have always had to be very careful and not strain myself or work too hard or too long at a time. If I do strain myself or work too hard it at once brings on the chronic diarrhoea.

About a year ago I had Dr. Livermore of Stone Mass for inflammation of the bowels.

I am now at work for the Assabet Manufacturing Company at Maynard Mass. They do not give me steady work. But I can work for them about three quarters of the time, and ~~that is~~ all I am able to work.

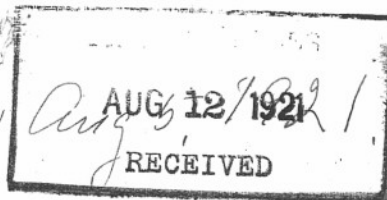



I Fannie E Elliott, of Maynard County of Middlesex State of Massachusetts, depose & say.. That I am a Sister of Daniel H. Elliott of Maynard.. late a private in Co. F. First Maine Cavalry.. That I was at my Father's house at North Dasselboro Maine, when my Brother Daniel H. Elliott was brought home from the Army by my Father. That was in February 1864. He was very ill then with Chronic Diarrhoea and for a long time did not gain strength or flesh, on the account of Chronic Diarrhoea, for nearly two years he was sick with it.. When he grew stronger he went to Oxford, Me. to work but returned soon after & was sick at home for some months with Chronic Diarrhoea, in 1867 he was sick about seven months.. In April, 1868, I commenced boarding with him in Norway, Me. & remained there untill Sept-1868.. during which time I do not know of his having worked a full month & ^{he} was sick with Chronic Diarrhoea the most of said time,

After I left Norway in Sept-1868, I was not with him again untill April 1874. having been out West

during that time often heard from him and of poor health continuing.

My Sister. Mary H. Knight of North Gray Me. had his eldest daughter with her the larger portion of the time for several years on account of his poor health not allowing him the means to provide for his family as was really needed.

In June 1875 My Brother Alpheus E. & his wife Myra M. Elliott. of Ottawa Kansas took home with them my Brother Daniels youngest daughter & have kept & provided for her since then.

Since my return from the West in 1874 I have been with him the greater part of the time and I do know that he suffers the larger part of the time with Chronic Diarrhoea & Pains. and has never been able to do hard labor as it brings on the Chronic Diarrhoea at once.

I have aided him during the past five years by giving him money as needed by him.

In 1877 he was obliged to give up work for some six months on account of Chronic Diarrhoea. in 1878 he was sick with the same and in 1879 he had a very severe attack of

Inflammation of the Bowels & Chronic Diarrhoea
and for some days was not expected to recover
his Physicians not giving the least hope.
He has been troubled with it ever since said time
I frequently see him Clasp his hands across
his Bowels & groan with the Pain

I am boarding with him now and I know that
often he is obliged to work all day when he can
scarcely get to his work for as the years pass
he grows weaker and suffers more with Chronic
Diarrhoea. he has lost a good deal of time since
he came here by sickness

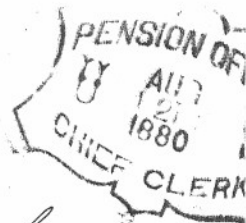

I, Mary F. Knight, of North Gray, in the County of Cumberland, and State of Maine, depose and say that I am the sister of Daniel W. Elliott, that I am thirty years of age, that I was at my father's house at Vassalboro, Kennebec County, State of Maine, when my brother Daniel W. Elliott, a private in Co. D, First Maine Cavalry, was brought home from the army. That was in February, 1864. That he was very weak from chronic diarrhea, so weak that he could not help himself any when brought home. Father and mother had to handle him the same as a mother would an infant. For a long time he did not gain flesh or strength he had chronic diarrhea so bad. For some two years after he came home, he was very sick with it, then he got some better and went to Oxford, Maine, to work in the factory. In a short time he was obliged to return home on account of the chronic diarrhea. He was sick at my sister's, Mrs. F. C. Chick, of Skowhegan, Maine, for two or three weeks.

and then went to father's and stopped there some three or four months, all the time sick with chronic diarrhea. In 1867 he was obliged to give up work entirely for three months on account of chronic diarrhea. In 1869 and in 1870 he was troubled with it; in fact, after he was brought home from the army he never could do any hard work or lifting without bringing it right on. He was sick the greater part of the time in 1869 and 1870 with it and it was a great effort for him to earn enough to care for himself.

I took his little girl in the summer of 1872 and kept her the greater part of the time until the fall of 1877 because he could not work enough to provide the common necessities of life for his wife and child. He came to my house in November 1877 and stopped until the last of December or first of January and was sick with chronic diarrhea at that time. Since that time I have not seen him but have understood that it was growing worse each year.

After he returned from the army there was not any considerable length of

time that he was not troubled with chronic
diarrhea and I feel sure that on account
of it he has been unable to work at all for
one fourth of the time since he came back
from the army up to the summer of 1877
and much of the time while he worked
he was troubled with it and suffered
great pain. Since 1877 I don't know
how he has been except as others tell me,
and I further say that I have no interest
pecuniarily in the prosecution of the
claim of said Daniel W. Elliott for
a pension.
