I knew George Flood prior to his enlistment; a short time, but not intimately. I had no opportunity of observing his physical condition previous to his enlistment. My first knowledge of his physical condition was when called to treat him for chronic diarrhoea, after his liberation from Libby Prison. He came to his father in the town of Maynard on furlough of 30 days I attended him professionally during that period, he not being able at the expiration of his furlough, ^{to prolong} got an extension of 30 days from me. I think he returned to Washington counting, one, but did not return to the Army; remaining in Washington he did Police duty there through his term of enlistment, I believe. I do not recollect having attended him since his discharge, but have known him ever since intimately. He has never recovered his physical strength fully, but retaining employment of a light nature he has managed to keep about. I was in court Nov. May, 1887, with Dr. Mank when he had pneumonia. He will never recover his health fully. He has never been able to perform manual labor to the extent of an able-bodied man. I have no interest in the above claim.
