I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt from your Office of application for Pension No. 136.319, and to return it herewith, with such information as is furnished by the files of this Office.

It appears from the Rolls on file in this Office, that Michael Powers was enrolled on the 27 day of Sept, 1861, at Lowell Mass. in Co. E, 20th Regiment of Mass. Volunteers, to serve 3 years, or during the war, and mustered into service as a Pvt on the 27 day of Sept 1861, at Lowell Mass., in Co. E, 20th Regiment of Mass. Volunteers, to serve 3 years, or during the war. On the Mustered Roll of Co. E of that Regiment, for the months of dated Nov 7 1864, he is reported Pvt. Mustered out with "In evidence of Wounds." The Co was in action at Cedar Creek Va. Oct 19 1864. His name appears at present to muster roll Nov 7 1864.

ID PENSION.

STATE OF MASSACHUSETTS, }

On this Twenty Fifth day of September

A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty light, personally appeared before me a clerk of the Superior Court within and for the County and State aforesaid,

Michael Powers, aged 38 years, a resident of Marlboro, in the State of Mass who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is the identical Michael Powers, who enlisted in the service of the United States at S. Acton, on the 27th day of September, in the year 1861, as a Private in Company F commanded by (26th)

regiment of Massachusetts

Volunteers, in the War of 1861, and was honorably discharged on the Seventh day of November in the year 1864; that while in the service aforesaid, and in the line of his duty, he received the following disability:

At Cedar Creek, Va., Oct. 19, 1864, was wounded in the right knee by a gunshot from the Rebels.

He was treated in the following hospitals, viz.:

Since leaving the service he has resided at Marlboro, in the State of Mass and has been occupied as bootmaker

For the purpose of prosecuting this claim he hereby appoints GEO. S. DERBY, of Boston, Mass., his Attorney, with authority to receive his pension certificate.
